

Phil and Marlys Litton were high school sweethearts that married in 1952. They had six kids (Duane, Linda, Mark, Neil, Brian and Chad) and have always enjoyed being at a lake in Minnesota. As a child, Phil's mom worked for a family with a cabin that they shared with his family on Stuart Lake near Clitherall. While raising their six children, Phil and Marlys were able to enjoy lake life at a resort owned by Phil's sister and brother-in-law, also on Stuart Lake. But their ultimate goal was of having their own lake property. They realized their dream in 1984 when Phil and Marlys purchased the property on the Southwest side of the

main lake, just as you enter the West Arm.

Fisheries Improvement

As the Summer winds down, a lot of memories of this and past summers surface. It's always nice to look back and smile and wonder what will be next.

The lake was as busy as I remember with boaters both for fishing and recreation. That is great to see everyone using the resource. I know I appreciated the higher water levels this year and the abundant rains to keep everything green for so long into the Summer.

This year, there was a bi-annual DNR test netting completed in early Spring (Panfish only) and mid-Summer (all species). Initial counts have been delivered, but the website does not have the latest survey data. The data will be compiled and available on the website later this year.

The summarized data that the DNR has shared with me includes:

Walleyes: Counts are significantly down. The average catch rates are 8-10; this year the count was 4.2. Sizes were consistent with previous years and included 8"-24" samples.

Northern Pike: Consistent over the history at 8-12 fish; minor improvement in quality.

Yellow Perch: Declined even more significantly than Walleyes; very few within the test nets. This downward trend is similar to what other larger lakes within Otter Tail County are experiencing.

Bluegills: Numbers were consistent and size quality continues to maintain.

These are some alarming trends that have raised a lot of questions with concerned members and have been discussed with the DNR. Unfortunately, there are few answers. There has been some discussion on the netting procedures due to the clarity of the lake (a result from zebra mussels). The clearer water allows fish to avoid the nets. We have also discussed possibly adding more stocking of Walleye fry from the State. Other options discussed with members include stocking the lake with larger Walleye fingerlings. These are areas that we continue to consider to help improve the fishery within Star Lake.

As for some good news... it appears that the panfish limits on Star Lake will be reduced down to 5 for Bluegills and 5 for Crappies. This change will be effective on March 1, 2025. A number of members attended the Lake Management Meeting in September and there was no resistance to make those changes.

Enjoy the Fall and looking forward to the Winter Season!

Solar Speed Sign Update

The solar speed signs that were installed on Minnesota State Highway 108 in May of 2023 by the MN DOT of Detroit Lakes have been a topic of discussion since they were installed. The speed sign for the Eastbound traffic has been operational most of the time. Unfortunately the sign for the Westbound traffic (by Rocky's Resort) has had issues. After numerous calls and emails made to the MN DOT of Detroit Lakes, our board has been notified that there are a couple of defective components that need to be addressed. The DOT is working with the company (Traffic Logix) to trouble shoot the issues and will reinstall the digital part of the sign not working. All parts are still under warranty. The Board of Directors feds strongly that the installation of these speed signs has helped keep traffic speeds lower and therefore keeps our residents in that area safer. Reflecting on Summer 2024 and Looking Ahead to 2025

AIS Committee

Over the past three summers, the AIS Committee has been working diligently to educate Star Lake property owners about the ongoing threats posed by Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS). Through Facebook posts, visibility at our annual meetings, and the popular "Throw-a-Rake" events, our hope is to build an educated lake community committed to best practices and early detection. These efforts are crucial because the most effective defense against AIS is best practices and early detection! So, thank you for your efforts and please continue learning about Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS), as your knowledge and actions are essential to keeping our lake healthy.

We are all familiar with zebra mussels. First identified in Star Lake in 2019, this aquatic invasive species is prevalent across our shoreline. Did you know that one zebra mussel can filter up to a liter of water per day? And zebra mussels reproduce and mature more quickly than native mussels. The effects of their presence in the lake will continue to be seen over years and even decades.

The next significant threat to Star Lake is **Curly Leaf Pondweed** (CLP). While we have not yet detected CLP in Star Lake, many neighboring lakes have been battling it for years. For example, nearby Lida Lakes have had to contend with CLP infestations, which have caused harmful algae blooms and significant ecosystem disruption, as well as a disruption to boating due to the formation of large floating mats of curly-leaf pondweed on the surface of the water. As a result, they formed a Lake Improvement District (LID) to manage their AIS problems. A LID is a special-purpose local government entity that helps fund and organize lake management activities, including annual treatments of invasive species like CLP. However, creating and maintaining a LID can be expensive, with costs often passed on to property owners through assessments

At Lida Lakes, annual herbicide treatments to manage CLP have cost tens of thousands of dollars, and these efforts are ongoing. As CLP is nearly impossible to eradicate once established, the focus becomes management rather than elimination, which translates into a permanent financial burden on the community. This is why early detection is so critical for Star Lake By identifying and addressing any signs of CLP early, we can potentially delay the need for such drastic—and costly—measures. Our call to action begins early next spring: "ice out" means "eyes out" looking for this AIS!

Starry Stonewort is another AIS that poses a significant threat to our lake. This invasive macroalgae has already been discovered in other Minnesota lakes and is known for forming thick, tangled mats that outcompete native species and disrupt recreational activities. What's most concerning about Starry Stonewort is that, like CLP, it doesn't go away. Once established, it becomes a permanent fixture in the lake, requiring ongoing management to minimize its spread and reduce its impact. Lakes already dealing with Starry Stonewort are forced to spend large sums of money each year to control it, with no hope of full eradication.

As we look toward the 2025 season, the AIS Committee is committed to expanding our education and monitoring efforts. We will continue our **Throw-a-Rake** events, monitoring the public access points on the lake, as well as resorts on the lake that come with a lot of boat traffic. While it may sound like a fun, lighthearted activity, the importance of these events cannot be overstated—they are a vital part of protecting Star Lake's health. Next year, we hope to increase frequency of and participation in these events and offer even more opportunities for property owners to engage in early detection efforts. We will even offer to visit your property to help check your shoreline and dock areas for any signs of invasive species.

Together, we can ensure that Star Lake remains a beautiful and vibrant place for generations to come. Your continued commitment to protecting our lake is invaluable, and we look forward to working with you in 2025 to safeguard this precious resource.

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STARLights - Print and Mail or Email

The Star Lake Property Owners Association has published a newsletter two times a year (Spring and Fall) for the membership since the Fall of 2008 – and maybe even longer. We have gone from a printed and mailed newsletter, to an electronic newsletter at various times – primarily due to costs. In the Spring of 2021, the SLPOA Newsletter was sent to members by email as a PDF document. The only printed copies were for the members that did not have an email address (or did not provide us with one). Brenda and Aubrey Ebanks were instrumental and did an amazing job in implementing and managing this newsletter, and had decided to retire!

I took over the responsibility of putting together the SLPOA Newsletter beginning with the Fall of 2021 issue and renamed it "STARLights – Highlights from Star Lake for Members of the SLPOA". As a retired USPS employee, I was aware of opportunities to take advantage of Non-Profit Mailing rates and free tools for small businesses for generating mailing labels that allowed us to qualify for the lower automation rates by printing barcodes for USPS sorting. As a former USPS Sales Representative, I also knew and promoted the value of reaching customers through their mailbox. **Not all mail is junk mail** – only if it is not of any interest to the recipient.

The SLPOA Board of Directors supported my recommendation to once again print the SLPOA Newsletter so that we could reach all members with a newsletter that they could read at their leisure, have it out on the counter, and pass it around to others and guests in their household. Since the Fall of 2021, STARLights has been a hard-copy publication that arrives in your mailbox twice a year. The STARLights newsletter is also available to read and download on our website. We notify you with an email that has a link to our website, and we publish a post on our Facebook page and Facebook private group with a link to the STARLights newsletter.

The subject of the cost of printing and mailing is before us once again. We can afford the costs of the printing and mailing, but is this how you want us to spend your membership dues. It is wise to review it periodically and ask for feedback from you. **Is the printed copy of STARLights of value to you as our members?** The cost is about \$2.30 per issue: \$1.90 for printing, \$.25 for postage, and \$0.15 for the envelope. If we have 250 members, that equates to about \$575 per issue, or \$1,050 per year. In comparison, we can continue to notify you via email and Facebook posts when the newsletter is available, along with a link to our website. You could then choose to download and print it, or read it online. We have 8 members that have not provided an email to us that we would require us to mail a hard-copy STARLights newsletter.

The 2025-2026 SLPOA Membership Form will be updated to allow you to give us your feedback on the continuation of a hard-copy STARLights newsletter. You can also **call or email** anyone on the Board of Directors. We appreciate your honest feedback. Thank you!
