# A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

# **CAMP AQUILA PURE MAPLE SYRUP**<sup>TM</sup>

Nestled in the woods of Star Lake Peninsula resides Stu and Corinne Peterson, owners of Camp Aquila Pure Maple Syrup<sup>TM</sup>. Looking at Star Lake Peninsula from the lake, you would not know that it is home to a tree farm and sugar bush operation where award winning maple syrup is produced.

The name, Camp Aquila Pure Maple Syrup<sup>TM</sup> is taken from the history of the property where the sugar maples are located. Prior to becoming a tree farm and sugar bush operation, the property was the well-respected "Camp Aquila for Boys". From 1948 to 1976 the property was operated as the well-known private camp.

When you read about them on their website, you learn that the name Aquila, literally, "The Eagle," is from a constellation in the Milky Way which appears in the summer sky over Star Lake. A fitting name with all of the majestic Bald Eagles we see soaring around Star Lake!

Stu and Corinne have mastered the art of producing maple syrup. Their numerous awards are proof! Most recently, they won a Blue Ribbon at the Minnesota State Fair in the category "Golden Maple Syrup, Delicate Flavor", a category that is not easy to produce. The golden (lightest) color is made from the early-season sap. Later in the sap-running season, the sap typically produces darker syrup.

The maple syrup production, when the sap begins to run, typically begins in mid-March and continues through mid-April. Sap usually runs on warm sunny days following cold below-freezing nights. Sap will run for a few days and then taper off waiting for the next freeze-thaw cycle. The sap will run and be collected until the trees begin to bud.

It is quite amazing to see what goes into producing one of those beautiful bottles of award-winning Camp Aquila Pure Maple Syrup<sup>TM</sup>. When you drive onto their property, the first thing you will see related to their production (besides the gorgeous trees) are the miles of tubes extending from tree to tree throughout their massive woods, tapping 1300 sugar maples.

The tapped trees connect to tubes that run into buckets. Gravity helps with efficiency by connecting several trees to a single line that flows down-hill into a larger collection container. The fresh sap is then collected by using an ATV equipped with a pump and is then transported to their "Sugar Shack".

The spotless "Sugar Shack" contains state-of-the art equipment for production. Watching the sap being boiled on the commercial food-grade evaporator is amazing. The sap starts out at 97% water and 3% sugars. The sap is boiled until it is reduced to 33.5% water and 66.5% sugars, resulting in pure maple syrup. From the evaporator, the syrup is reheated to 190 degrees F, filtered to remove all sediment and then "hot packed" and bottled in retail containers ready for market. The production continues with the bottling and labeling process, which is done according to State and FDA requirements.

So, how many gallons of sap from a sugar maple does it take to make just one gallon of pure maple syrup?

#### 35 gallons of sap = 1 gallon maple syrup

Stu and Corinne's goal is to be one of the best "small" producers of flavorful, high quality pure maple syrup. I think they've achieved that! Just look at the list of many awards they've earned!

Because of limited access and the unpredictability of the maple season, Camp Aquila is not open to the public for tours or sales, unless arranged by prior appointment. # **Fisheries Improvement**

Hi – I hope everyone was able to enjoy the resources available at Star Lake this Summer. Although, many fought with low water issues, there were lots of boats out and about.

The Minnesota DNR completed their lake survey in mid-July and the initial catch rates will be posted to the SLPOA website. The formal DNR writeup will be completed through the Winter months. The State does this process every three years to gauge lake fisheries health. Once the formal report is available, there will be a link available for you to access or it can be found on the MN Lakefinder website at:

All historical reports are contained on the website and date back to 1973. There is lots of free information there that is available to anyone with web access.

A Swamp Shark tournament in 2022 is in the planning stages. More details will be available in the Spring as they become available.

## **Aquatic Invasive Species**

Fishermen and boaters must follow state laws designed to protect our waters. The catchphrase CLEAN IN CLEAN OUT in short means to clean your watercraft/trailer, drain all water and dispose of unused bait (in the trash). Some Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) are small and difficult to see at the access. Especially when moving to another waterbody from a waterbody posted for zebra mussel or spiny waterflea infestation, it is recommended to do one or more of the following: 1) spray watercraft/trailer with high-pressure water, 2) rinse with very hot water, and 3) dry for at least 5 days. Also run your motor and personal watercraft for a few seconds to discharge water before leaving a water access. Transport your fish on ice. Refer to the MN DNR website for the expanded explanation of these laws and recommendations.

Fishing and boating are not the only activities that require education and proper action to control the spread of AIS. An activity that you might not think about is waterfowl hunting and it is that time of year. There is a section in the MN DNR website that discusses the extra things you need to be aware of when hunting waterfowl. "Clean aquatic plants, animals and mud from boat, motor, trailer, waders or hip boots, decoy lines, hunting dog, anchors (elliptical and bulb-shaped anchors can help reduce snagging aquatic plants), push poles and ATVs." There is a brief video to view on this topic and it also reminds hunters to drain their boats, leave the plugs out when traveling and to drain their decoys. An additional reminder is to cut cattails or other plants above the waterline for blinds or camouflage in accordance with regulations.

A section on Waterfowl Hunting can be found under *Aquatic Invasive Species*, then go to *What you should do*. Click on *Boating and water recreation. Waterfowl hunting* will be at the bottom of the page with a link to a short video.

If you suspect a new infestation of an invasive plant or animal, take a photo and note the location, or save a specimen and report it to the local DNR invasive species contact: Mark Ranweiler, 218-671-7945.

# **Water Quality**

Carolyn and Don Herron have been taking responsibility for Star Lake water testing for over 20 years. Water samples and Secchi disk readings indicate phosphorus levels, chlorophyll-a/algae and water clarity. As phosphorus increases there is more food for algae. More algae results in a decrease in water clarity. The optimal situation is a balance between a good amount of algae for the lake's food chain but not too much to make the lake unpleasant for swimming and other water activities.

Through the efforts of our "citizen scientists", Star Lake participates in the RMB Environmental Lab's Lakes Monitoring Program. RMB is located in Detroit Lakes. You may be familiar with it from doing your own well water testing. Lake water testing occurs monthly from May to September. The samples are taken by inserting a 2 meter PVC tube into main body of the lake where the depth is about 90' deep. These are surface samples. Secchi disk readings are taken over this location and one in the north arm. Water samples and paperwork are taken to the lab or other collection site. The findings become part of a large database coordinated by RMB. It is available to us and other interested parties. The findings help us to "catch any water quality issues early on to prevent detrimental impacts". Bruce Due and Lee Mindemann assist in the water testing process.


The grant that the SLPOA gives for shoreline landscaping to minimize lakeshore run-off and erosion is done in an effort to reduce phosphorus in our water. How many property owners remember when individual properties were checked for septic system integrity approximately 20 years ago? Bringing septic systems into code compliance also helps to reduce septic effluent and phosphorus.



# **Water Safety**

The Water Safety team had their work cut out for them this year as more hazards were appearing across the lake all summer. They determined that we needed more buoys on Star Lake to keep our boaters safe!

The Board of Directors for the Star Lake Property Owners' Association recently approved the purchase of six new buoys. The cost - \$1,551.00. We were able to save quite a bit (\$225.00) by having them shipped to JoLene Kerr's (Board Member) employer in Fergus Falls rather than shipping to Dent.

The original intent of the Board was to add a few buoys to new locations on the lake, and have a few available to use in the future. But with the low water levels we experienced this year, we will most likely be placing all six around the lake next Spring. The buoys are being delivered to the Water Safety team so that they will ready to install in the Spring.

The Water Safety team also spends a lot of time to repair our buoys whenever possible. When a buoy breaks away from its chain and ends up on someone's beach, every attempt is made to repair what "broke" and reinstall the buoy. The team has had to replace several chains and carabiners due to corrosion and rust.

# **SWAMP SHARK TOURNAMENT 2021**

Fair skies, light winds, and lots of smiles were present on Saturday, June 19<sup>th</sup>, 2021 for those taking part in the second SLPOA "Swamp Shark" tournament. There were (35) teams registered with (32) having checked in by the end of the tournament. Over half of the teams were youth/adult teams. The overall winning team was comprised of two sisters captained by their Dad and Mom (and former SLPOA President), Eric & Joslyn Peters. It was great to see their smiles when they finished first! They also received most creative team name award. We pressed, but they were not ready to commit to how they planned to use their prize money. Overall, most teams had success with the smallest Northern measuring in at 10.5 inches.

As reported to the MN DNR, no team member boated a Northern over 26 inches. The largest caught (and released) was 24 inches. Most of the Northerns taken were in the 17-22 inch category. The lack of any being caught over 26 inches is concerning. The MN DNR test netting results over several cycles has shown very few or no large Northerns. SLPOA will continue to try to educate those fishing Star Lake to return ALL Northerns over 24 inches to the fishery. Large Northerns play a key role in the regulation of the small Northern population. Last year there was only one caught that exceeded the 26 inch mark.

The 2021 tournament was established with three goals:

- Provide a structure to engage kids and adults in a day of fishing;
- Lend support to one of the local business operations impacted by COVID that has been a good supporter of the lake association for several years;
- Help reduce the abundance of small Northerns in the fishery and improve the balance in the system in keeping with fisheries science research and Minnesota allowed limits.

Those goals were meet by the tournament. Also, virtually no fish were wasted. (I did destroy one of the fish donated to me, due to it being infected with black spots). Three teams donated their catch to other fishermen under the Minnesota transfer of catch rules. Some Northerns were destined to be part of a family pickled fish project. Others were destined to be part of a fish fry, a grilling session, made into chowder, or pickling. SLPOA made an effort to provide every team with cleaning guidelines, recipes, and make it a "catch and clean" event. Based on discussion with the teams, that proved effective.

Thank you to all the people that enjoyed the tournament experience including one young man by the name of "Pike." Cannot find a better team member than a boy named Pike!
