
Star Lake History Book Available

"What happened to the fish?"

Growing up and spending summers on Star Lake, I was able to spend many days out on the lake in our small boat with a 5 hp motor tooling around and dropping a line to fish. My friends and I caught Sunfish, Crappies, Walleye, Northerns, Perch and even a Bullhead or two. I didn't like getting a Bullhead on my line – in fact I would cut the line rather than taking the fish off the hook! Those stingers were nasty! But I don't remember a time when we didn't catch anything. Many of you have similar memories. There have been many generations of great fishing stories on Star Lake.

In the last few years, the conversations about fishing have changed from from fishing successes, to "what happened to the fish?" The families that are on the lake year around have expressed concerns about the number of fish houses out on the lake in the winter, and the lack of enforcement of the limits. Fishing Guides have been bringing in large groups during the winter taking out a significant population of the fish on Star Lake. We are also experiencing the effects of having the Invasive Species Infestation of Zebra Mussels for 6 years, (many of which are not known) on the overall health of the fishery.

Last years' test netting conducted by the Minnesota DNR confirmed what many of us had suspected and have been experiencing: the Walleye population was down significantly. A quote from the DNR 2024 Lake Survey Report: "Walleye abundance in the 2024 survey was the lowest recorded for Star Lake." The Crappie and Sunfish population are also noticeably down.

A couple changes were implemented by the Minesota DNR to improve our fishery on Star Lake:

- The daily bag limit for Crappies and Sunfish was reduced from 10 to 5 effective March 1, 2025 with the goal to maintain or improve the size structure of the Bluegill and Black Crappie populations in Star Lake (hopefully this will also steer the guides to other lakes and away from Star Lake); and
- 2. The DNR stocking plan for Walleye Fry has changed from 2.8 million every 2 years, to 1.4 million every year, with the goal of improving consistency of survival.

The DNR also asks that anglers help maintain the quality of the fishery by practicing selective harvest. Selective harvest encourages the release of medium to large size fish while allowing the harvest of more abundant smaller fish for table fare. Releasing the medium to large fish will ensure that the lake has enough spawning age fish on an annual basis and will provide anglers with more opportunities to catch large fish in the future.

SLPOA members Mike Anderson and John Bialazynski are longtime residents on Star Lake and have taken on another strategy to help build back the Walleye population. They have had several meetings with the DNR Fisheries Supervisor discussing the Walleye Stocking options for Star Lake. The DNR stocks Walleye Fry (mosquito-sized walleyes) in the Spring as it is more cost-effective. The survival rate of fry can be very inconsistent – some years are booms and some are a bust. Fingerlings (6-8 inch Walleyes) can be stocked in the Fall and the results can be much more consistent. But the cost of Fingerlings is much higher than Fry, and typically not funded by the DNR.

After many meetings, research and conversations with neighbors, Mike & John took on the challenge of raising monies to fund the cost of stocking Walleye Fingerlings in Star Lake. Many of you have spoken to either or both of them. The overwhelming support of Star Lake residents has resulted in raising over \$18,000 dollars for this project.

So, thanks to Mike Anderson and John Bialazynski, we now have a 3rd strategy to improve the fishery on Star Lake – Stocking Walleye Fingerings.

Working with 10,000 Lakes Aquaculture, a permit has been approved by the

Minnesota DNR and Star Lake will be stocked with up to 430 pounds (about 7,300) of Red River strain Walleye Fingerlings. The stocking will take place in four locations – in front of Franks Lodge in the West Arm; at both Public Accesses (North and East); and in front of Bell's Resort. By the time you read this newsletter, the stocking will be completed. It will take several years for the fingerlings to reach 1 pound or about 14 inches.

Mike and John are already working on plans for ongoing fundraising efforts so that they can continue this stocking strategy for a minimum of three years. Stay tuned for more information!

A big Thank You to Mike and John for your dedication and all of the work you have done to help our grandkids enjoy the same excitement and fishing experiences that we were fortunate to have in our youth.

Water Safety

AQUATIC INVASIVE SPECIES

In May, Star Lake was represented at the Lake Stewardship Symposium, where members had the opportunity to learn from experts, connect with other members of area lake associations, and bring back valuable insights to apply at Star Lake.

At our annual meeting in June, we set up an interactive AIS display where folks could get information about AIS, get a closer look at what these species look like, and ask questions.

The Star Lake Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) team has also been on duty this season, keeping a watch for invasive species. Fannie Snowberg, AIS member, kicked off the season with a kayak tour of the south arm. Other monitoring efforts were conducted throughout the summer months. The May "throw-a-rake" was held at the Highway 108 access. In July and August, Ebert's Resort and Spruce Lodge hosted a rake throw. Each event confirmed the presence of Zebra Mussels and Chinese Mystery Snails - two invasive species that remain active in our waters. Fortunately, we did not detect any new invasive threats. We were happy to work with AIS team members from Dead Lake this year and we plan to continue that collaboration.

Our team is especially vigilant for the presence of **Curly-leaf Pondweed** and **Starry Stonewort**, both of which can spread rapidly and cause serious harm to lake ecosystems. Early detection is critical. It is important for everyone to be aware and report it if it is detected.

How You Can Help:

- ♦ Clean, Drain, Dry your boat and gear every time you leave the water;
- ◆ **Don't release** unused bait, plants, or aquarium pets into the lake;
- ♦ **Keep your eyes open** if you spot something unusual, let us know;
- ♦ Know the features of Starry Stonewort and Curly-Leaf Pondweed so you can report them if you detect them.

How to Spot These Species¹:

Starry Stonewort:

- Long, smooth branchlets are attached in whorls of 5 8 and branch asymmetrically at tips
- ♦ Stems are smooth
- Small, star-shaped bulbils form on clear threads at base of the plant and may be found above or below the sediment surface
- Small, orange spheres may be visible, these are male reproductive structures
- Branches typically several inches long
- Can form surface mats

Curly-Leaf Pondweed:

- ◆ Thin submerged leaves have distinct "teeth" and wavy edges (They have been compared to lasagna noodles.)
- Leaves do not clasp around the stem where they connect
- Produce Turions that look like small greenish brown pinecones
- Generally the first pondweed to come up in the spring and can form dense mats on the water surface. It dies back in midsummer.







Our AIS work is a team effort. Thanks to all who volunteer their time, stay informed, and do their part to keep Star Lake healthy and thriving.

AQUATIC INVASIVE SPECIES AND ME

Since retiring in 2019, I had spent my time focused on family and myself. In the fall of 2023, I attended an event that hooked my attention. The keynote speaker spoke on the "Power of Saying Yes." After wallowing a bit in the realization, I wasn't saying yes to much of anything unless our kids, grandkids (and sometimes Butch, my spouse) asked, I set the intention to say yes.

I believe in synchronicity. Merriam Webster Online Dictionary defines it as the coincidental occurrence of events and especially psychic events that seem related but are not explained by conventional mechanisms of causality) So when a friend, Linda Dimitrivich (former SLPOA member on the AIS team) told me she was moving and asked if I'd serve as the AIS representative on the Star Lake Board I said yes.

When I began serving on the AIS team of SLPOA I didn't even know what AIS stood for! I took the U of M AIS Detector Class in the spring of 2024 and I know a lot more about it now! I still have a lot more to learn. A few things I know for sure: there are changes in our ecosystem that we have no control over; there are changes in our climate we have no control over; and we DO have 100% control over our attitude, concern, and behavior. That makes a vitally important difference to the environment in and around the lake we love, Star Lake. Each and every one of us makes a difference.

I also know the difference between native *Northern Watermilfoil* and invasive Eurasian watermilfoil. Although they look similar, native Northern watermilfoil has 4 leaves per "whorl" and 4-11 leaflet pairs. *Invasive Eurasian Watermilfoil* is feathery looking with four leaves per "whorl. It has a central axis with 12-20 leaflet pairs. Invasive Eurasian watermilfoil has not been detected in Star Lake. If you see it, report it.

Native Clasping-leaf Pondweed (widely detected in Star Lake) has leaves that alternate along the stem. The leaves look like they wrap around the stem. Hence the name, Clasping Pondweed. The leaves are wide and wavy but don't have teeth like invasive Curly-Leaf Pondweed. Invasive Curly-Leaf Pondweed has thin leaves with distinct wavy edges

(described as "kind of like thin lasagna pasta"). Generally it is the first pondweed to come up in the spring and it dies back in midsummer. If you see it, report it.

The University of Minnesota AIS Identification Guide provides valuable information on many aquatic plants, invertebrates, and fish. For more information, go to https://maisrc.umn.edu/guidebook.

If you'd like to learn more about AIS, join the AIS team on one of the rake-throws. It takes about an hour and the process is simple. One of us tosses the rake in

the lake and pulls out, well, whatever is on the rake. We separate the different species pulled off the rake and compare them to species in the AIS Identification Guide, then log it. If we come upon an invasive species, we take a picture of it, bag it, and report it on the EDDMaps website, where they are tracked. Thankfully, the only invasive species we've detected in Star Lake are Zebra Mussels and Chinese Mystery Snails.

The Star Lake AIS team consists of myself, Lee Mindemann, Kristin Daniels, Fannie Snowberg and Bonnie Graham. Talk to one of us if you have questions or concerns. We'd love to have you join us on a rake throw or as a team member!

Memories of Star Lake

Anyone who has been on Star Lake for a time has great memories, especially of my favorite subject - the restaurants that were on the lake. My memories go back to my first year on the lake.

In 1972 my parents were here visiting some close friends who lived in Vergas and they spent a week. When they came home, I visited them and asked how their vacation went. My mother said "Ask your Father". Uh oh, that was not good! It turned out that Dad had bought a cabin on a lake in Otter Tail county - on Star Lake! Mom was not thrilled. He already had developed the pictures he took of the cabin, the place where he wanted to retire to. For a guy who liked to fish but never could afford a boat, here was a Cabin on a Lake! Quite a shock.

The year 1972 was also the beginning for a new adventure for two young guys from the Barnesville area, Steve and Mike. Their lives on the lake matched my years when they purchased a long time feature on the lake, Rocky's Resort. There was a restaurant, a small grocery store, a bar, bait, licenses - everything that lake visitors could want. A six pack, a newspaper, a quick burger for lunch, a license and a dozen minnows - they had it. As it worked out, Mike was there all day, and Steve came in late and stayed until closing. You could run a tab so all your purchases were put on your tab and you could settle up with a check when you left. As life went on, Steve's kids were always there. I have pictures of his daughter Stephanie running around in diapers. It was a family business.

They were two very different fellas. Mike was quiet, a collector and some thought his main attitude was 'grumpy' or 'mean'. Kids were leery of him - in fact my daughter was scared of him much prefering to talk to Steve who was much more outgoing of the two. In my visits to Rocky's, I mainly met up with Steve. Later on when I visited the lake, I would gravitate to Rocky's at night for a quiet Schmidt's and a talk at the bar with Steve. A Seabee Vietnam veteran, we would chat. Those who went there will remember the sign over the bar that expressed a liking for those who liked to Bull S\$\$t. We would sit their nursing our Schmidt's and telling stories, likely joined by then owner of District 166, Dale, after he closed the restaurant and was headed home.

I remember the great food they served - the great malts, the hash browns cooked in the serving plates (none better anywhere) and the great views of the lake from the dining room. They served lettuce salads with French and Thousand Island dressing, a mixture I like to this day. But, for the kids, the malts were the best. You got a glass of malt and the metal mixing container with the rest of the malt. I can't tell you how many malts were on my tab once my daughter found out she could go down to get me a dozen minnows and charge them to my tab. Minnows on the side, a malt was foremost.

Steve was a handyman as well. I know he used his skills to do lots of small jobs for my parents. He installed windows and put on our new roof. My dad was a truck driver, not a carpenter, so Steve's skills were utilized.

But, as the years went by changes occurred. Mike reached retirement and sold out to Steve, and Steve must have worked every hour the resort was open. Once open till 1 am, now he closed at 11. Later the restaurant, always open year round, was closed in the winter. But that spawned Friday night fish fries with Gene (Steve's father-in-law), for many years a staple. My dad suffered dementia and for several years it was Steve who took my mother to the grocery store, or delivered supper when the restaurant was open. When my mother became ill it was Steve who made sure she made her doctor visits. When she went to a nursing home it was Steve who watched over the cabin.

Time also caught up with Steve: he retired and wanted his children to run the restaurant and resort but it was not meant to be. So, Steve closed one of the landmarks on Star Lake - Rocky's resort. I asked him if he was going to sell and he said no. He had offers but he wanted the people who rented from him to be able to stay on the lake. And then came the fire that destroyed the building. Gone forever except in our memories.

Time marches on. Now there is just one full service restaurant on the lake - Bell's - along with The Corner Store, now run by Pierre's daughter (Yvette) with pizzas (Tuesday is pizza night - Yay!) and a small menu. The youngsters who worked summers are gone, I guess they don't have to work as my generation did, which is both good and bad. But what remains are the memories.

I hope you have a great winter and I look forward to seeing you in the spring, maybe at pizza night, making memories on Star Lake.
